Winter Range TG Report - from our Range Master, TJD

I attended the Winter Range TG meeting. There was only one topic on the agenda which was the continuing discussion about the new rule regarding coming to the firing line with the hammer cocked. This was 30 minutes of listening to people who struggled to understand the clear explanation.



In short.

- 1. If you come to the line with the hammer cocked ... DO NOT LET GO OF THE RIFLE ...
- 2. When instructed point the rifle safely downrange and pull the trigger.
- 3. BANG = STAGE DQ. NO BANG = NO CALL.

If you let go of the rifle you will get a SDQ, regardless.


When the floor was opened there was discussion on 2 topics

- 1. Requiring Match Directors to be RO-I or RO-II certified for SASS sanctioned matches. I kept my mouth shut. This is a stupid idea. Requiring some who is working his ass off so that SASS gets \$5 per shooter to spend his own money. and time = Bad business decision.
- 2. How to deal with temporarily impaired or permanently impaired shooters. For some reason there was a lot of discussion on how to deal with this in a fashion similar to a pilot taking himself out of cycle for illness or injury. No actions or recommendations came out of this.

Lee bullet casting molds: since there has been some interest in reloading as well as casting bullets we will take a look at the Lee molds. There are custom mold makers out 'there' and as you might expect they are very proud of their products. It is very likely the costs can run over \$100 per mold. I will admit that they do have very good products but when you are on a fixed income the Lee molds are enticing at about half the price.

If you go the way of Lee molds you should consider them "some assembly required." I have two new ones and both have the sprue plate slightly off. What I mean by this is when you completely close the plate the far end of the mold will slightly open. This leads to 'finned' bullets which are rejects.

I have tried two ways to correct them: first I enlarged the sprue plate hole by using the next size up drill. That has cured most of the binding. When this didn't completely work I enlarged the notch on the sprue plate so it doesn't bind on its stop screw. Both were used on my last one and now the mold closes fully and I get good bullets each and every time.



Sometimes the "Cowboy Way" smacks you in the face: recently Ruby Red Rider, Ramblin Gambler and I set up a meeting at the gas station across the street from the range road on 1774. Meeting time was 9:00 a.m. My plan was to get there early so they wouldn't have to wait on me—I arrive 15 minutes early

and both were already there because, as you might have guessed, they didn't want to make me wait. Everyone took into account the other persons and did not put themself first.

Goes to show you that there are still folks today who hold the same ideals as our cowboy ancestors did 140 years ago.



Cutting Lead Blocks with a chop saw...or not: the one consumable of casting bullets is lead, Pb, the Silver Stream. It's getting harder and harder to find lead as wheel weights, "plastic" army men and paint no longer contain it. Some people still smelt it (Fast Tracker for one) while other wimps like me order it on line.

Smelting requires you locate a source, melt it down, clean out all the trash and then pour it into usuable chuncks. And after all that you still need to cast bullets from it.

I finally broke down and starting ordering off the web. While you can all sorts of quantities on ebay, I find much better prices at two places. The Great American Lead Co http://www.thegreatalaskanleadco.com/ out of Alaska will sell you a 30 lb block of hard lead for \$42 which includes shipping. Work out to \$1.40 a lb. Only problem is it's one block of lead. I have learned you can cut it with a chop saw but that makes a mess, noise and, think about it, my fingers and a moving blade—recipe for disaster.

Presently I get mine from "The Captain" who is a vendor on Castboolit http://castboolits.gunloads.com/showthread.php?63886-Lead-Ingots-For-Sale-Buyer-s-Choice. Cost is \$67.55 for 50 lbs = \$1.35 a lb and it comes in easy to use ingots.

Another company is RotoMetals https://www.rotometals.com/bullet-casting-alloys/ which has certified alloys that run around \$3 per lb.
