

Territorial Governor Report from EoT

Hi all.

I attended the TG meeting at EoT. There were no agenda items and precious little floor conversation.



► The only topic was a shooter who was making his own black powder and his loads were very inconsistent and considered dangerous. The question was should SASS have a position on this? The answer was each club is an independent operation and each club is responsible for safe operations of their club.

Inconsistent loads represent a risk to all participants and it was suggested that if the shooter could not load consistent ammo he should get better ammo or not shoot.

Targets, Target Order and Target Stands

Some clubs allow that if you hit the target stand that is counted as a hit. The target stand by the very nature of having its own separate name is NOT the target. Most clubs do NOT count the target stand as part of the target. TRR does not count the target stand as part of the target. You could miss the target by a foot or more and still hit the bottom of the target stand. That is a MISS.

► A quick reminder that we at TRR do not care if a shooter wants to number the targets left to right or right to left. A 1,2,3,4,5 sweep is the same shot either direction. The same holds for all sweeps and any stage scenario directions where the targets are numbered. This gives the shooter option and choices. We want everybody to have as much safe fun as possible.

The General Store Floor

Has been repaired. Support beams were added, a sub floor added and the original floor piece reinstalled. Took less than an hour and I was still drenched in sweat. (see additional article on this below)



Looking forward to the Fall/Winter: Are you an **arborist**?

Do you know what that it means? Can you pronounce it? If any of these are within your skill set you are just the person we need come time when the leaves drop (from the cold not the heat.)



We have two sets of native trees growing to the left of our road as you get even with the porta-potty building on the south end of the range. They could use some pruning for two reasons. First it is a *bear*, grizzly not teddy, to mow around them. They do all they can to dislodge the operator of the mower.



Second, the ***TRR Flora and Fauna Committee*** ably chaired by **Rawhide** feels some judicious thinning and general cropping of the foliage would add to the overall ambiance of the range.

We also have the **Lazarus Tree** planted by **Lorelei Longshot** in his honor that may or may not be in need of similar services but this would need to be discussed with her before anything it done to that memorial.

Remove Barrel Leading using Penetrating Oil:

every so often I get some stubborn leading that seems to defy all scrubbing techniques including wrapping the bore brush with copper “steel” wool. That’s when I break out the Kroil® Oil and let chemistry take over from brute force.

This method will probably work with any type of penetrating oil but since Kroil® is one of the most expensive I use it <humor>. Another required item is a rubber stopper that fits tight in the bore and there is the optional bullet level to keep the firearm vertical. It does take a bit longer than the bore brush and patches but most of the time is letting the oil do its “thing.”



And he even took pictures as he completed the job!





Kroil Oil, rubber stopper, bullet level, revolver frame with cylinder and pin removed

In this picture the revolver is held in a vertical position. You can see the stopper in the forcing cone and the level resting on the back of the frame.

A poker chip is on top to keep the oil from evaporating during the soaking time.





Another view better showing the poker chip and level in the frame.

Once you have the revolver positioned add oil to the top of the bore and cover with the chip, if not used the oil level will drop quickly due to evaporation.

I usually let let the barrel soak overnight then the next day return the oil to its container and use a tight fitting brush wrapped with the copper strands to remove the leading.

Remember the oil will not remove the leading just get under it so it will come out when you use a bore brush.

After the brush and a few patches I finish with a clean patch with a few drops of Rem Oil or similar.

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
