Match this Saturday: October 2, 2021: match of 6 stages.

Registration cut off 8:30

Let's talk about some of those non-SASS categories TRR recognizes: we have several home grown categories that you may (won't) find at other clubs. Here is the list with explanations:

.22 category: given the current ammo and component situation and TRR is all about maximizing the amount of fun shooting at stuff®, we have modified our .22 category a bit.

Before all your cartridge guns needed to be .22 caliber but we now allow .22s along with centerfire guns—mostly is boils down to bring whatever you have and shoot it (single and lever action of course.

This means you could shoot a .22 SA revolver, .357 SA revolver and .22, .357 or .45 Colt lever rifle or some other combo of calibers.

Mix and match, pick and choose—bring what you have to fulfil the "2 single action revolvers, a lever action rifle and a single, double, 97 pump or 87 lever shotgun" requirement.

To paraphrase Lt. Rasczak (again!), "Everyone Have Fun!" still from Starship Troopers

Buckaroo/Buckarette: under 13 years of age. Can shoot .22/.410 and does not need to knock down plates or KD targets

Young Guns M / F: under 16 years old. Otherwise same as buckaroo

Junior M / F: under 18 years old. Otherwise same as buckaroo. At this age most will be shooting SASS caliber firearms.

Cody-Dixon (no longer used at TRR): this is a southern category where the shooter engages rifle targets from 75-100 yards out and shoot their pistol at the SASS rifle targets. The rifle is a rifle-caliber gun and can be lever action or single shot. Round count is 6 cartridges. Our range limitations sent this one to the bench before half-time

Sharpshooter (TRR's version of Cody-Dixon) only major differences are the rifle is pistol caliber and you shoot 10 rounds not six.

Sharpshooter-Lite: same as Sharpshooter except pistols are shot at SASS pistol targets

Rifleman (two rifles, no pistols): shoots one rifle at pistol targets, the other at the rifle targets. Came about due to medical condition

Josey Wales (4 pistols, no rifle): two pistols are used for the pistol targets, other two pistols for the rifle target. Comes from the movie *Josey Wales*

Outlaw: pistols and shotgun are fired from the hip, rifle from the shoulder.

Renegade: may/can shoot a different category at each stage. Some clubs require you change categories for each stage, other clubs let the shooter decide if they want to change every time. TRR doesn't require change for each stage

WB-Lite: uses 1911 with 5-round magazines and shoots the cowboy directions. Came about due to ammo shortage.

By the time you read this we might have come up with the **Over Weight** Cowboy/girl that shoots right handed and walks with a limp—stranger things have happened.


"The List" of Chores to be done at the range on Major Saturday workdays upon arrival of cooler weather:


In spite of not cooling off yet the Elves and Worker Bees have reduced the list. Here is what is still outstanding (numbering is from original list):

Tale of Two Firing





Come Sunday and I'm on the Internet ordering a new steel one. Pioneer Gun Works shows a 3 day delivery so I don't have to pull the one from my backup rifle.

I'm waiting and watching and finally on Friday, the day before the Sept 4 match I check the tracking info.

Pioneer is in Springfield, OR. They shipped the new one on Aug 31. On Sept 2 it has traveled 2 miles west to Eugene, OR, just across the Willamette River. On Sept 3 it is sitting in Portland, OR, about 100 miles north of Eugene, never mind Houston is 2,240 miles southwest of Portland*.

Somehow I didn't think it will be delivered by the end-of-day to my home and pull the backup's firing pin.

*yes I know mail needs to go to 'hubs' to be sent cross country but I chose to overlook that to make the story more interesting.

Of What should Firing be Made? ▲ Above is my story about changing out firing pins . . . but which one should be used: the titanium (Ti) or steel version? They are close in price so what would make you pick one over the other?

The Ti version is touted to weigh less and therefore better to be used with light aftermarket springs. There is not as much Mass to get moving so you can use lighter springs and still ignite the primers. It is also harder than steel and there is the "sexy" factor of being what all the *Fast Guns* use. What's not to like?

The problem turns out to be the *harder than steel* fact. Harder translates to brittle in firing pins and it just so happens mine was Ti.

The difference in Mass of the Ti and steel version is not enough to accept the possibility of having the tip break, at least for me it isn't. I went we the steel version when I ordered my replacement and as luck would have it, my backup rifle's one was already steel.

Gunsmithing Hint: Ti is not magnetic, steel is, so you can check what material your firing pin is by using a magnet. You can even do this with the pin in the bolt.

GS Hint II: if the tip does break off it has to go somewhere. Caution advises taking the rifle apart to see if the tip is still inside the rifle—mine was and it was just waiting to jam up the works *down the trail*.

Now let's see what's next to wear out/break?
